3. SHARE WHAT YOU ARE LEARNING OR QUESTIONS ABOUT GOD WITH YOUR FRIENDS AND FAMILY.

4. HONOR GOD WITH THE BIG AND THE SMALL THINGS YOU SAY AND DO.

Why is summer Bible reading important for kids?
